

INFERRING INFORMATION

OBJECTIVE

Students learn to make inferences from the information with which they are presented.

INSTRUCTIONS

- ★ Tell the class that you can learn a lot about a situation by the decisions people make, the actions they take, and the words they say. Give the example of a person who makes lots of promises to do something but never does it. In this case, actions speak louder than words.
- ★ Tell the class that it is important to be aware of people's actions, especially those of our elected officials and candidates.
- ★ Activity
 - Students will act things out in front of the class without talking. The rest of the class will try to guess what the student is acting out.
 - Choose student volunteers and give them specific actions to perform in front of the class. Choose actions that lead to rational conclusions, such as yawning = being tired.
 - Give the students hints if they need help performing their assigned actions.
 - Give each student about 30 seconds to act, and then have the class guess their action.

Actions ideas

smiling = being happy, shivering = being cold, wiping forehead = being hot, yawning=tired, limping=sore foot, wide eyes=surprised, etc.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- ★ Why is it important to look not only at what people say but also what they do?
- ★ What happens when you base your opinions on actions alone?
- ★ How can observations lead to smart decisions? Is it better to pay attention to both what a person says and what they do?
- ★ What can other people tell about you based on your actions?
- ★ How does this connect with leaders and candidates? When we hear what someone says, what else do we need to do to know more about that person and their actions?
